

Voting in Vermont

1. Are you eligible to vote?

- a. 18 or older
- b. US citizen
- c. Resident of Vermont

2. Do you have proof of eligibility?

- a. Valid photo ID (driver's license or passport)
- b. Current utility bill
- c. Current bank statement
- d. Another government document containing your residential address

3. How do I register to vote?

- a. By visiting your city or town clerk's office and completing a voter registration form in person
- b. You may also register to vote at the polls on election day
- c. Using Online Voter Registration System: <https://olvr.vermont.gov/>
 - If a first-time registrant, must take the voter's oath, which may be self-administered

5. Can I vote absentee?

- a. You may request an early absentee voter ballot by phone, fax, email, mail, or in person at your local clerk's office

6. How do I vote absentee?

- a. Complete paper form in person at city or town clerk's office
- b. Complete request for early absentee voter ballot form and mail, fax, or email to local clerk's office:

 - All early voter absentee ballot requests must be submitted by 5 p.m. or by the close of the town clerk's office on the day before the election
 - All ballots must be returned to the town clerk's office before the close of the office on the day before the election, or to the polling place before 7 p.m. on the day of the election, in order to be counted
